YOU HAIKU

In the sequencing activity of this lesson, you wrote your own sequence of events to describe something you do or like. Use the topic you chose to write a haiku.

A haiku is a type of traditional Japanese poetry. It follows a set pattern of syllables. A syllable is a part of a word pronounced like a unit. For example, “haiku” is a word made of two sound units: hai-ku. “Minnesota” is a word made of four syllable word, made of four sound units: min-ne-so-ta.

A haiku is made of 3 lines. The lines rarely rhyme. The first and last lines are made of 5 syllables. The second line is made of 7 syllables.

Use the topic of your sequencing sentence to write a haiku. Here are two examples:
